## **About WPDHAC**

The Western Pennsylvania Disability History and Action Consortium (WPDHAC) was established in 2015 to preserve and honor the historic struggle of Western Pennsylvanians with disabilities to attain human and civil rights. The Consortium educates the public about disability history in order to improve community access, participation and equal opportunity, and to ensure disability rights through existing and new policies and laws.

Western Pennsylvania is home to a significant amount of disability history. The region has a strong record of grassroots advocacy to ensure public education, transportation, and home- and community-based services, and to end the segregation of people with disabilities in the region's state-run institutions. The Consortium takes the lead on preserving and sharing that history.

Our vision is to engage the public in the dynamic history of people with disabilities, to honor people who were mistreated or denied their rights, to recognize the efforts of individuals with and without disabilities to effect positive change, and to raise public awareness of contemporary issues, including the ongoing effort to maintain humane policies and laws.

## **Our Accomplishments**

The Consortium has accomplished significant achievements since its founding in 2015:

- **SURVEYING** 600+ individuals and organizations in 26 counties throughout Western Pennsylvania to document historic materials and stories and to offer preservation guidance. We have had meaningful engagement with 100+ entities.
- ADVANCING the preservation of disability history materials on a range of topics. Increasing the number of collections and amount of information about disability history available to the public.
- HOSTING one to three public events per year, in person and online. Attendance of 100+ at most events.
- PRESENTING 20+ talks about Western
  Pennsylvania disability history (in person and
  online) to student, community, academic and
  professional groups, including regional and
  national conferences.
- PRODUCING ten multimedia histories about a range of disability history topics.
- REACHING a growing online audience through newsletter, social media, and comprehensive website that acts as a hub for Western Pennsylvania disability history.
- PARTNERING with local, statewide, and national disability history groups to connect the Western Pennsylvania story to the larger narrative.
